

# Let's Create a Family Timeline

In recent years, record-breaking heavy rains caused by typhoons have occurred one after another across the country, resulting in large-scale flooding and landslides. In our Prefecture, approximately 4,200 people were unable to evacuate in time from the torrential rains in the Kanto and Tohoku regions in September 2015, and approximately 330 people were unable to evacuate in time from the East Japan Typhoon in 2019.

To prevent this from happening, create a Family Timeline prior to disaster to identify what each household should do to avoid delay when evacuating.



## O What is a hazard map?

A hazard map shows areas at risk of flooding or landslides and evacuation points (e.g. designated evacuation centers) in the event of a disaster, with areas that may be flooded highlighted. It is advisable to check in advance whether your home location is likely to be flooded.

Hazard maps can be found on your municipality's homepage or by contacting the municipal department in charge of disaster management.
